

November 5th , 2014

Sam Droege from the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center at the US geological survey was our special speaker. Title: What do you really know about bees?

Amazing photographs accompanied Sam's talk on pollinators. The talk was less about honeybees and more about the wide world of bees. There are more than 420 native bees species in Maryland. While honey bees gather pollen from many types of flowers, native bees are often specialized to just one or only a few plants. Plant a variety of native plants and manage for biodiversity. Mow your lawn just once a year in March if possible. Trees are not nearly helpful to bees as flowers.
